#### **Always Something to Do**

When kids come home from school or have time off, there's always something to do. The Common House has a piano, pingpong table, foosball, and a room full of toys, art supplies, and costumes. Our library holds games and books for all ages. Outdoors, we have a grassy area and play structure, fruit trees, veggie gardens, a fleet of skitters, a basketball hoop, room for hide and seek, and sidewalks that invite chalk art.

Everyone is on a first-name basis. Kids interact with adults in the courtyard, at common meals, game and movie nights, and informal encounters. Field trips have included swim parties, camp outs, excursions to the mountains and theater. Neigbors get together for art projects, music, and drumming.
